Dear Neighbor,

Happy first week of July! I hope you've all found ways to beat the heat. With budget season over, my staff and I look forward to tackling projects that had been placed on the back burner, and assessing our work over the first six months. Be sure to read our Mid-July Newsletter where we will highlight our accomplishments since January and set the vision for the rest of 2013.

Like I mentioned in my last newsletter, on April 20th, many of you participated in the Great American Litter Pick-Up. Guadalupe Oak Grove Park was one of our locations for the event and the great progress that was made that day is just a fraction of the work still needed to make the park safe for hikers and free of fire hazards. This is why my office is working with neighborhood groups and others to organize quarterly clean-ups at the park. This coming Saturday, July 6th, from 8:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m., we will continue working where we left off in April and we'd love to have your help! We will be pruning trees and removing coyote brush, so please wear the appropriate clothing and shoes. Tools and gloves will be provided, but feel free to bring your own as well (no power tools). Reminder from the San Jose Police Department:

As we approach Independence Day, The San Jose Police Department (SJPD) reminds residents that **all fireworks are illegal** to possess and ignite in the City of San Jose. The SJPD, in coordination with the San Jose Fire Department, wanted me to let all of you know that individuals who possess, store, sell, or use any materials deemed to be fireworks, is in violation of the law and subject to arrest. Violation of these laws can result in a fine of up to \$1,000 and possible jail time according to California Fire Code (CFC 7802.3) and the San Jose Municipal Code (SJMC 17.12.730). Please help the San Jose Police Department by celebrating this July 4th without the use of illegal fireworks. To report incidences of illegal fireworks in your neighborhood, please call the police non-emergency number, 3-1-1. If you provide the SJPD with a good description of the offenders (approximate height, weight, age, clothing details, etc.), the police may be able to catch up with them, provided they are not responding to higher-priority calls.

SJPD Summer Safety Initiative

Also, with respect to summer safety, the SJPD has established a Violent Crime Reduction Plan to reduce the number of violent incidents (both gang related and non-gang related) in our City. The plan was established as part of a focused, proactive effort to reduce violent crime as well as increase police presence and visibility in our community. This plan was the result of several strategic internal meetings convened by Acting Chief of Police Larry Esquivel. Like me, Chief Esquivel shares our resident's concern over the number of recent violent incidents in our City.

The 2013 Violent Crime Reduction plan consists of three phases that increase in intensity as the summer months progress:

Phase One covers the remainder of the month of June and consists of the deployment of 20 two-officer Patrol Gang Suppression Cars per week, as well as limited personnel from the Special Operations Division, MERGE (SWAT) Unit, and METRO Unit.

Phase Two covers the month of July. It includes several components and adds to the already-increased uniformed presence of June. Twelve additional two-officer overtime Patrol Gang Suppression Cars will be deployed on a weekly basis, bringing the total to 32 cars (64 officers). The work days and hourly work schedule of the MERGE Unit officers will be modified to provide a greater presence, especially on weekends and during peak hours.

Phase Three, which covers the month of August, includes the creation of a Gang Suppression Unit.

In the interim, our City Manager, Debra Figone, has appointed Deputy Chief Ruben Torres as Acting Fire Chief. The appointment of Deputy Chief Torres will ensure continuity and stability for the Fire Department until the recruitment and selection process for our next chief is completed. Chief McDonald and Deputy Chief Torres will work closely together during the transition period. I look forward to working with Deputy Chief Torres.

Another appointment - one that I am very pleased to announce - is the selection of our newest

Youth Commissioner, Mason Kimmel. Mason is a senior at Leland High School and has been an active member of the District 10 Youth Advisory Council. His leadership and communication skills are very impressive and I expect nothing but great things from him as our Youth Commissioner. I also want to thank Alexander Polussa, our former commissioner, for his service to the district, the youth in our area, and the City of San Jose. I wish him the best of luck in college and know he will continue to be a great leader among his peers.



Beautiful Neighborhoods Initiative

I cannot tell you how often I get complaints about the terrible condition of Almaden Expressway - weeds that are taller than some of the bushes, trees and bushes that are poorly trimmed and unattractive, and, of course, the walls with chipped paint, broken boards, and missing panels.

People have asked what they can do to help, so my office has been working on a two-part plan that we are calling the Beautiful Neighborhoods Initiative. We are partnering with Santa Clara County Supervisor Mike Wasserman and the County Roads and Airports Department, since the County manages expressways in San Jose. Also involved in this initiative are several building contractors, PG&E, local businesses, service groups such as the Boy Scouts and Kiwanis, churches, and residents of the local community.

Part One focuses on Almaden Expressway. The first stage of Part One will target the south end, from Blossom Hill Road to Henry. Arrangements are being discussed for eliminating the weeds and improving the landscaping. Much of that work will be done by contractors and County workers for safety reasons. There may be opportunities for volunteers and we will let you know when that happens. In addition to the landscaping, the walls will be getting a fresh coat of paint and replacement boards. We are working on arranging work days when volunteers will be able to come together and paint sections of the wall. More details will follow in future newsletters.

Part Two of the Beautiful Neighborhoods Initiative focuses on the concrete walls within our neighborhoods that are privately owned. Recently there have been complaints about the wall around the northeast corner of Redmond and Meridian. We are in the process of working with the neighbors who own the wall to plan a repair project. Many of the neighbors are unable to make the repairs themselves and appreciate that the community is willing to help. We are planning this project for early July with painting to be done on July 13th. We still need a few more volunteers to help on this day, so please contact my office at district10@sanjoseca.gov or 408-535-4910 if you are able to help.

Please note that the County will be working on removing weeds from all of the expressways over the summer, and there will be other stages in our Beautiful Neighborhoods Initiative in the future that

focus on the remainder of Almaden Expressway in our district, Capitol Expressway, as well as privately owned walls in other neighborhoods throughout District 10.

My staff members and I are doing everything we can to work with the various departments involved and clear away all the hurdles, but this initiative will only succeed with your help. We look forward to working with all of you to spruce up our neighborhoods.

Along similar lines, I want to thank and recognize Gary Beck, a D10 resident, for taking it upon himself to clean up litter along the Almaden Expressway, beautifying the area. Gary has been faithfully carrying on this task for many years. I am so fortunate to be the representative of a District that is full of wonderful volunteers just like Gary, going out of their way to improve our community.

Cancer Prevention Study

The American Cancer Society's Epidemiology Research Program is inviting men and women between the ages of 30 and 65 years who have never personally been diagnosed with cancer to make a commitment to enrolling in this long term study. The ultimate goal of CPS -3 is to enroll at least 300,000 adults from various racial/ethnic backgrounds from across the U.S, with the goal of better understanding the lifestyle, behavioral, environmental, and genetic factors that cause or prevent cancer ...and to ultimately eliminate cancer as a major health problem for this and future generations.

The enrollment process involves signing an informed consent form, completing a written survey, and getting a waist measurement and small blood sample at an onsite appointment site. CPS-3 participants must also be willing to complete follow-up surveys at home periodically over 20-30 years. Go to
