HIGHWAY 85 EXPRESS LANES INFORMATIONAL MEETING

In my last two newsletters, I have written about the terrible gridlock on Highway 85, and the VTA proposal to implement the Express Lanes Program. The Silicon Valley High Occupancy Toll (HOT) Lanes Program (referred to as the Express Lanes Program) has been under development since 2003. The SR 85 express lanes project is within the central corridor of the Silicon Valley Express Lanes Program being implemented by the Santa Clara Valley Transportation Authority (VTA). This project will convert approximately 27 miles of existing High Occupancy Vehicle (HOV or carpool) lanes to express lanes. The project will also add a second HOV express lane between SR 87 and I-280.

Next Monday, December 8th at 7:00 PM, the Almaden Valley Community Association will be hosting an informational meeting for residents to learn more about this program from VTA staff. The meeting will be held in the Santa Clara Valley Water District Boardroom at 5750 Almaden Expressway. HOLIDAY SAFETY TIPS

With the Christmas season upon us, here are a few safety tips compiled by the Los Angeles Police Department that you should be aware of to ensure that you and your loved ones have a safe and happy holiday:

Shopping:

- Shop during daylight hours whenever possible. If you must shop at night, go with a friend or family member.
- Even though you are rushed and thinking about a thousand things, stay alert to your surroundings.
- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash, pay for purchases with a check or credit card when possible, and try to keep cash in your front pockets.
- Be extra careful if you do carry a wallet or purse. They are the prime targets of criminals in crowded shopping areas, transportation terminals, bus stops, on buses and other rapid transit.
- Avoid overloading yourself with packages. It is important to have clear visibility and freedom of motion to avoid mishaps.
- Beware of strangers approaching you for any reason. At this time of year, "con-artists" may try various methods of distracting you with the intention of taking your money or belongings.

Driving:

- Avoid driving alone or at night.
- Keep all car doors locked and windows closed while in or out of your car. Set your alarm or use an anti-theft device.
- If you must shop at night, park in a well-lighted area and avoid parking next to vans, trucks with camper shells, or cars with tinted windows.
- Park as close as you can to your destination and take notice of where you parked.
- Never leave your car unoccupied with the motor running or with children inside.

- Do not leave packages or valuables on the seat of your car. This creates a temptation for thieves. If you must leave something in the car, lock it in the trunk or put it out of sight.
- Be sure to locate your keys prior to going to your car.
- Keep a secure hold on your purse, handbag and parcels. Do not put them down or on top of the car in order to open the door.
- Do not approach your car alone if there are suspicious people in the area.
- Ask mall or store security for an escort before leaving your shopping location.

At Home:

- Be extra cautious about locking doors and windows when you leave the house, even for a few minutes.
- When leaving home for an extended time, have a neighbor or family member watch your house and pick up your newspapers and mail.
- Leave a radio or television on so the house looks and sounds occupied.
- Large displays of holiday gifts should not be visible through the windows and doors of your home.
- When setting up a Christmas tree or other holiday display, make sure doors and passageways are clear inside your home.
- Be sure your Christmas tree is mounted on a sturdy base so children, elderly persons or family pets cannot pull it over on themselves.
- If you use lights on your Christmas tree ensure the wiring is not damaged or frayed. Frayed or damaged wiring can cause a fire.
- Place your Christmas tree in water or wet sand to keep it green.

Ethics Commission Vacancy

APPLICATIONS are being accepted for the Ethics Commission. The San José Ethics Commission (Commission) monitors compliance with all campaign and ethics ordinances in the San José Municipal Code. The Commission reviews and investigates allegations of violations of the Code and makes recommendations for enforcement action where appropriate. The Commission also makes recommendations to the Council with regard to campaign and ethics regulations and policies. The Commission is charged under Chapter 12.04 of the San José Municipal Code to investigate complaints alleging violations of Title 12 of the San José Municipal Code and take enforcement action. Formal regulations are adopted by the City Council to ensure that all interested parties are apprised of and understand the procedures by which a fair hearing will be conducted.

QUALIFICATIONS: The Clerk's Office is recruiting for up to three positions on the San José Ethics Commission to fill four-year terms ending March 1, 2019. Applicants must be registered voters in the City of San José and, if appointed, must remain so throughout the term of office. While serving on the Commission, no member can hold any other public office nor publicly endorse any candidate for City office or engage in any political or campaign activity on behalf of any candidate for City office. Further, no member can participate as a candidate in any election to public office for a period of one year before and after tenure on the Commission.

APPOINTMENT PROCESS: All applications received by the deadline will be submitted to the Mayor and Councilmembers who will notify the City Clerk as to whom they would like to interview. Applicants receiving four or more such indications of interest will be notified and asked to appear during a regular or

special Council Meeting to be interviewed by the Mayor and Council. Applicants must receive a two-thirds vote of Council (8 votes) to be appointed to serve on the Commission. The tentative date scheduled for interviews is on Tuesday, February 10, 2015.

Applications will be accepted through 5:00 p.m., on WEDNESDAY, January 14, 2015.

Our City Forest Holiday Rent-a-Tree Program

Our City Forest is helping Silicon Valley get green this holiday season and change their wasteful practices by bringing living, potted trees into their home or office for decoration and festivities. Participants enjoy the traditional look and smell of a live tree with much less waste, mess, and fire hazard. Plus, a live tree cleans the air in your home, and after its holiday debut, lives on to be planted in a school, garden or park nearby.

For the month of December, Our City Forest invites families, friends, companies and organizations to rent a living tree from its Community Nursery & Training Center in San Jose. Participants can reserve their trees immediately by calling, emailing or visiting the nursery. Tree species available include traditional options such as Western Red Cedars and Italian Stone Pines, as well as non-traditional options like olive trees, also known as the trees of peace. Our City Forest is asking for donations of \$80 - \$100 per tree, which is comparable or less than the cost of

Foam Food Ware Ordinance – Effective at All Restaurants in San José January 1st

Starting New Year's Day 2015, diners at all restaurants in San José will no longer receive their soups, beverages, or leftovers in foam containers. After one year of compliance required from only multi-state chain restaurants, all San José restaurants, including small businesses and food trucks, will stop using foam food containers this January. To replace Expanded Polystyrene (EPS) foam containers, restaurants can use any other food containers of their choice. Options for alternative containers include paper, plastic, foil, and biodegradables.

EPS foam food containers are a uniquely problematic form of litter in our rivers and creeks. EPS foam containers do not degrade and tend to break into small pieces. These small pieces are very difficult to clean up, and are harmful to fish and wildlife when mistaken as food. By eliminating the use of foam containers, we improve the health of our water, wildlife, and community.

To participate:
